To participate and earn WVC credit, you must meet the placement requirements for college level coursework.

Why take a College in the High School class?

Enhance your skills and build confidence to do college level work from a familiar space

Saves money spent on tuition

- A 5 credit class at WVC is typically ~\$680

Reduce the amount of classes after high school to complete a college degree

WVC credits are transferable to colleges/universities within Washington and many others outside the state.



Things to be aware of

While courses will transfer across universities and colleges across the state, they may:

Not transfer accordingly to your program of choice

- For example, English 226 at WVC may be a Humanities, but counted as an elective at WSU
 - As a senior, begin having these conversations with your school of interest to know more about how credits will transfer

Be a prerequisite!

- Many universities in the state of Washington have core requirements that incoming freshman need to complete. AA credits will typically count towards these requirements.

College in the High School courses are taught at the same rigor as what you would experience at WVC.

- Plan your study schedule to allow more time for assignments and readings
 - ~2 hours a day for each day you are in class
- Grades earned will become a part of your permanent college record and count towards your college GPA.
 - College GPA is not the same as HS GPA

Impact on Financial Aid

Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) is a requirement for students to maintain a certain level of academic performance to remain eligible for federal, state, and institutional financial aid. The three SAP requirements are:

- Grade Point Average: A student must maintain at least a 2.00 cumulative grade point average.
- Course Completion Rate: A student must complete at least 50% of their attempted credits each quarter and at least 67% of their attempted credits each academic year. Courses for which a student has withdrawn or failed do not count as successfully completed.
- Maximum Time Frame: A student must complete their program within 150% of the program length.

Credits from prior schools that are accepted and applied towards a degree will be counted in the total maximum attempted credit (MAC) limit of eligibility for aid. Until an official Transfer Credit Evaluation is completed by an advisor or by the Admissions office, all prior credits will be assumed to be transferable.

Academic Dishonesty: Procedure 1400.125

Any student who engages in any form of academic dishonesty may be subject to discipline. Common instances of academic dishonesty include: cheating, plagiarism, resubmitting work previously submitted for another course without instructor permission, etc. Academic dishonesty may be subject to both academic and/or code of conduct sanctions.

Students are expected to maintain high standards of academic honesty and integrity in accordance with the code of student conduct.

Plagiarism: *submitting to an instructor any work product which the student fraudulently represents to the instructor as the student's own work product, for the purpose of fulfilling any assignment required by the instructor as a part of the student's program of instruction. Students are expected to know and comply with accepted classroom procedures and academic standards as set forth by the instructor.*



Students Rights and Responsibilities

Students have the right to expect a classroom climate in which all students:

- are given the opportunity and encouragement to succeed
- are treated with dignity and respect
- demonstrate good manners and courtesies
- are safe from sexual harassment and discrimination
- are free to ask for help anytime

In addition to rights, each student has the responsibility to:

- support a learning environment that provides opportunities to succeed
- serve as a positive role model for less experienced students
- respect the property and space of others
- refrain from swearing and using any inappropriate communication
- read and abide by the college rules found in the student handbook
- be accountable for their actions



FERPA: Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act

What does this mean?

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act is a federal law regarding the privacy of student records and the obligations of the institution, primarily in the areas of release of the records and the access provided to these records.

WVC has designated the following information as Directory Information and will release this upon request, unless the student has submitted a request for non-disclosure:

- student name
- major field of study
- quarters of attendance (including current enrollment)
- degrees & awards received
- extracurricular activities, height/weight of athletic team members, awards received, most recent previous educational agency or institution attended.

By taking a WVC course, you are seen and treated as a college student

Parents **do not** have access to student information. Students must communicate important information from the college with parents/guardians. A release of information form can be downloaded from our website and submitted by the student to give access to trusted individuals.

Admissions Process: Transfer Students

Apply for your colleges of choice!

Check out your university/college websites to see when their applications open/close and if there is early admissions.

Use your high schools unofficial transcript

Use the high school transcript while applying to give them an idea of the courses you are taking.



I have committed to a college!

Submit your official high school transcript **AND** your official WVC transcript to transfer your credits.

Official transcripts charge a small fee to be sent to each institution. Most colleges and universities require at least a C to transfer credits.

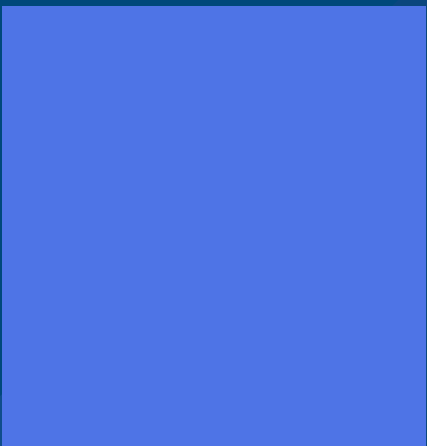
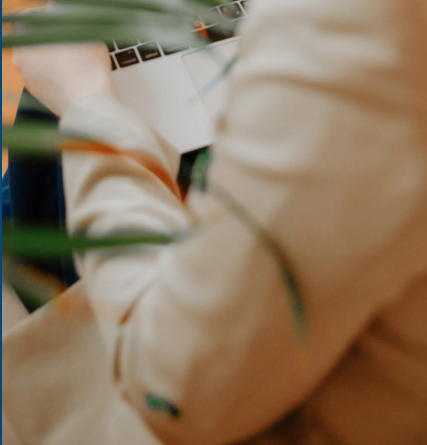
Library

ADA: Americans with Disabilities Act

What does this mean?

The ADA prohibits discrimination based on disability in various areas, including employment, government, public accommodations, and transportation. An individual with a disability is defined as someone with a significant physical or mental impairment, a history of such an impairment, or who is perceived as having one. The ADA does not list all covered impairments specifically.

Student Access Services supports all WVC students, including those in College in the High School. Disabilities vary and can be continuous, episodic, or temporary. Examples include learning disabilities, ADHD, autism, mental health issues, sensory disabilities, and medical conditions. Accommodations must be arranged in advance, as they cannot be applied retroactively.
